- 1. Approval of November 2020 Financial Report (ACTION) Ken Robinson, CFO



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Mr. Robinson presented the November financial report:

Net revenue is better than the previous year – collections have been outstanding.

Expenses that have significantly made an impact on the finances include:

- Productive salaries over by \$429K in nursing
- Non-productive salaries State mandated paid time off bank for COVID-19 has costs the Hospital \$741K
- \$1.5M in registry (29 additional contract nurses)
- Health insurance claims increased by \$500K
- Supplies PPE and pharmacy costs have increased tremendously.
- \$800K spent on Remdesivir.

November showed an operating loss of \$1.6M.

YTD - Operating income is at a loss of \$1.8M

If not for the \$10.2M received in September from the Cares Act, the Hospital would be at a loss of \$12M.

Volumes:

ER Visits are running 2000 less than the previous year ER admissions are higher this year by 41 In-patient surgeries are steady

V. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT – Ed Mirzabegian (INFORMATION ONLY)

A. COVID-19 Summary & Update

Mr. Mirzabegian provided the COVID-19 report for the month.



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Since the start of the pandemic, the hospital has seen about 16,000 patients related to COVID-19. Approximately 14,000 were negative and 2100 were positive. Approximately 1100 have been admitted, with 963 discharges. AVH currently has 154 COVID-19 patients in-house.

The hospital is busy and has the space for more patients if needed, but is very short-staffed. The hospital has made changes in patient ratios and made staffing adjustments as needed, but continue to struggle to have enough staff. AVH is working hard to make sure we take care of every patient.

Oxygen usage has increased and there is a shortage across the State. AVH is working with NASA to obtain liquid oxygen as a back-up resource. The ED is a difficult space to properly provide oxygen, given the age of building.

Space is also an issue and requires the hospital to make difficult decisions and put patients together in rooms. The Hospital has received help from State for emergency staff - 30 people started this morning including nurses, physicians, paramedics, etc. The hospital tents in place in preparation of a surge or if forced to go to code triage.

Kindred rehab hospital in the works. Board meeting set for January. The AVOIC buyout of the JV is complete.

Stay home orders are still in place – the hospital is doing everything possible for patient care. Little by little, the hospital may have no choice but to ration care.
